Contemporary urban activism: resistances and insurgences against the neoliberal urban organization

Neoliberal globalization has been producing profound effects on the accelerated expansion process of the planet's urbanization. Although there are significant differences between central and peripheral countries, this new phase of post-Fordist capitalist accumulation is marked by the financialization of the world economic order with spatial-temporal restructuring effects. The growing commodification of urban/metropolitan spaces and the transformation of welfare systems linked to the right to the city into financial assets are world evidences, although they occur in an unequal yet combined way in national and local contexts. Private appropriation and capture of public spaces, as well as processes of increase in sociospatial segregation phenomena, gentrification, peripheralization, environmental aggression and selectivity in access to public goods and services, are enabled by the adoption of urban entrepreneurship in the State's management and by the construction of urban regimes or sociopolitical coalitions to facilitate real estate investments as a new way out of the world capitalist crisis. The city-commodity is a real trend in the production of the urban space, with reflexes on daily sociability, especially in large cities and metropolitan regions.

This trend, although hegemonic, is not unilateral. Although the ongoing transformations negatively affect civic culture, associations and the creation of social capital, they also produce contradictions and conflicts of different natures. Thus, in addition to several agents that persist in actions grounded on the inclusive and democratic logic of the right to the city and to citizenship (in the sphere of political, party, state and cultural systems), it is possible to perceive the emergence of a new type of actions that can represent resistances against the ultraliberal urban order. Side by side with traditional thematic social movements (for example, housing and transportation), a variety of forms of social action has been emerging in Brazil and in the world, as well as distinct repertoires used by different actors that can be gathered under the general notion of public use of cities. The 2008 world capitalist crisis and the cycle of rallies that began in 2013 in Brazil have triggered a new stage in the field of urban social movements. The plural, diversified and heterogeneous character of the agendas and engagement of groups and social classes characterizes a new urban activism.

This issue of *Cadernos Metrópole* is dedicated to studies on action repertoires, agendas and construction of narratives by means of activism cases that represent resistances and insurgences at this moment of profound transformations in the production and use of the urban space. The publication will be one more contribution made by *INCT Observatório das Metrópoles* to explain, understand and reflect on successes and limits of different forms of collective action linked to the right to the city.
